The Montrose Community Foundation (MCF) continues to be a stable presence in Montrose and the surrounding valley through invaluable support from you.

LOCAL THEATRE BUILDS TOWARDS ITS FUTURE

AFTER 62 YEARS, ONE OF OUR COMMUNITY TREASURES IS HAVING A FACELIFT

Magic Circle Players has a dream to create a theatre that will invite everyone to come inside and experience the "magic" that is our community theatre. To date they have raised \$115,000 towards the \$1 million goal. They are



applying for various grants and will continue to fund raise. Magic Circle Players recently received Enterprise Tax Zone status, which means that when donors make a contribution they can claim extra tax credits. The intent is to begin construction in June 2023.

The exterior plan mirrors the nostalgia of traditional theatre architecture. An outdoor seating area will create a welcoming space that fosters community. There will be renovations in the entrance and interior spaces, the restrooms will be upgraded and expanded, and a larger, more efficient concessions area will feature an extended bar for intermission libations. Additional seating both inside and outside will allow guests to linger and socialize. They plan to add a streaming audio-visual presentation, archiving the organization's more than six-decade history.

UNCOMPAHGRE GIVES RAISES \$214K FOR LOCAL NONPROFITS IN FIRST YEAR

Uncompandere Gives is the Montrose Community Foundation's collaboration that allows donors one-stop shopping to contribute to valley nonprofits on the annual Colorado Gives Day. Formed last year, Uncompandere Gives benefitted 44 participating nonprofits, including MCF, to the tune of \$214,000 raised during the campaign. MCF was established as the coordinating Regional Champion.

Colorado Gives Day is the statewide day set up to promote giving and to make it easy to contribute online to Colorado nonprofits. Hundreds of nonprofits in the state are available for you to choose from as a donor and from which you can link to on our Regional Champion page. On this page, we display only the participating nonprofits from the Uncompahgre Valley.

Mark your calendars for this year's Colorado Gives Day: Tuesday, December 6, 2022.

It will be backed by a \$1.6 million dollar incentive fund which will be distributed proportionately. Other individual incentives will create additional fundraising opportunities for nonprofits who participate, making your donation go even farther.

Just so you don't forget, you may participate in early giving to the nonprofit of your choice any time between November 1st and December 4th, qualifying that nonprofit for incentive prize money.

It's easy to say that he is now 100% obsessed with dinosaurs!"

GRANT HELPS CREATE DEDICATED SPACE FOR VICTIMS

Montrose Regional Health (MRH) used the grant dollars from Montrose Community Foundation to purchase equipment to treat victims of sexual assault with more dignity and respect. The Hospital dedicated a room where Sexual Assault Nursing Exams (SANE) are conducted, and the grant dollars were used to purchase equipment for that room. Equipment included a digital camera for recording

the findings as well as some needed medical items to ensure there are no disruptions during the exam.

Finally, the caregivers bought some furniture, decorations, and other items meant to provide some comfort during a time that is stressful and frightening.

To date, the Hospital has conducted exams on almost 30 victims.

The Ouray Mountain Rescue Team was incorporated in 1974 to serve the technical rescue and emergency medical service needs of Ouray County and the surrounding mountain communities. The team is made up of 100% volunteers and services are free. For anyone who has recreated in our beautiful region and found themselves in a precarious situation, the rescue team is an essential service that responds 24/7 to calls. Montrose Community Foundation gave the organization a grant to help update their Rescue Barn, which was "functional, but not adequate".

COMMUNITY AND FOUNDATION LEADER WILL BE MISSED

CURTIS ROBINSON'S BEGINNINGS WERE SIMILAR TO THE FOUNDATION'S -HUMBLE

Arthur "Curtis" Robinson was born and raised in the San Luis Valley of Colorado in a home with no running water and one woodstove. It was through the GI Bill that he was able to attend Western Colorado University to study business and accounting. At the age of 28, Curt earned his CPA and became a partner at Dalby, Wendland & Co.

In 1989, Curt helped fund the precursor to MCF, the Montrose Rotary Club Youth Foundation, as a vehicle to fund community projects. Curt's accounting and financial background was an invaluable asset to MCF and other nonprofit organizations that he was involved with. He set up financial statements, investment accounts and accounting practices. His touch is a part of everything that I do with the foundation - from our Articles of Incorporation to our tax returns and Thank You letters.

In an interview that I had with Curt in 2019 for an MCF 30th Anniversary video - he felt that the most important community project that the foundation had was the conservation of the Shavano Petroglyphs. In 2002, the Foundation purchased the land to conserve the ancient Ute art, then sold it to History Colorado so it could remain in conservation. Dating back to 1000 BC, Shavano Valley Site is considered

one of the premier rock art sites in Colorado and has been used to interpret cultural styles and traditions of other petroglyph sites in the region. It took great foresight (and some risk) to invest in the property. That investment paid dividends for the community.

Curtis helped so many Montrose projects come to fruition in the 50+ years he lived here, including Cerro Summit, The Montrose Pavilion, Academic Booster Club, Rotary Scholarship Fund, MHS track and football field, Montrose Birthing Center, HopeWest Center for Hope, and more.

I will miss seeing Curt at the Rotary meetings that he faithfully attended. Whenever we met to talk about MCF, he would always set up a time to meet with me as he preferred to have a face-to-face conversation. That is how Curt got things done - with personal connections, numbers that supported his case, true grit and a passion for helping others.
